

Know How to Recognize an Opioid Overdose

Anyone using opioids, even in small amounts, can overdose.

Fentanyl and other dangerous substances are being mixed with or disguised as other drugs like heroin, oxycodone, cocaine and ecstasy/MDMA.

SIGNS OF AN OPIOID OVERDOSE



Blue or grey lips or nails



Dizziness and confusion



Can't be woken up



Choking, gurgling or snoring sounds



Slow, weak or no breathing



Drowsiness or difficulty staying awake


